The day was full with creative



crafts, eco-tours of the garden, live music, conversation, delicious food – including a magnificent, Ammerdown baked, birthday cake - and sunshine. On Sunday, Deputy Lord Lieutenant, Jane Sedgman, joined us for two special services. The first an interfaith gathering bringing people from the Jewish, Christian, Islamic, Buddhist and Baha'i faiths together. The

second, an ecumenical service of thanksgiving, bringing people from a wide spectrum of Christian denominations together. At these services, the Ammerdown Centre were welcomed into the Community of the Cross of Nails and Together for Hope by Canon Mary Gregory, Canon for Arts and Reconciliation at Coventry Cathedral, recognising Ammerdown's work in peace and reconciliation. This was a wonderful weekend, celebrating what has been and looking forward to what is to come.

#### **Four New Trustees!**



Have you noticed the bells hanging outside the dining room? The newly polished plaque says: These bells were presented to Ammerdown in 1987 by Harold L B Meyer to be 'used as dinner gongs as they were in my family homes in Berlin (1922-39) and Stanmore (1939-84). They were brought out of Berlin after Kristallnacht when the family fled the persecution of the Nazis. They hang here as a reminder ..... and to call us all to sit down together in peace.







#### **Social Justice Update**

#### Chaplain's Corner Autumn Break 2023

As a chaplain and a poet, I was glad to combine my interests to lead a Haiku-writing session at Ammerdown in September. We began by talking about the history and significance of the Haiku. We considered key works of Matsuo Bashō (1644–1694), Yosa Buson (1716–1784) and Kobayashi Issa (1763–1828). We then studied contemporary spiritual writers such as Martin Wroe (2022, Julian of Norwich's Teabag: Poems and prayers from morning to night). We wrote our own poems, adhering to the commonly (but by no means universally) accepted convention of producing Englishlanguage Haiku as three-line, seven-five-seven syllable poems. I shared examples of my own poetry.

# Balloons above Bath Fire-breathing burners Exclaim: We! Look! Down! On! You! Idle boasts. Hot air.

and here is one from Autumn Break... Ammerdown
Joy, Peace growth in Grace
through times of quiet
others then to serve

#### A few well-chosen words

In keeping with my Haiku-themed Spring Break workshop, I want to emphasise that brevity and clarity matter. This article is 600 words long. That's one 'I have a dream' (1963, Martin Luther King Jr, 288 words) plus one 'Gettysburg Address' (1863, Abraham Lincoln, 271 words) with an extra 41 words for good measure!

Like them or loathe them, political soundbites are there for a reason. Advertising slogans are hard to forget. Oscar Wilde's pithy quotes stay with us. A thick novel is not necessarily better or more enjoyable than a slim novella.

Over the years, I have found that ten kind words and a simple sincere condolence mean more than a shapeless sermon or a lengthy anecdote.

As Ammerdown's chaplain, I see how – in times of uncertainty, challenge, tragedy and grief – many people take solace and consolation in words from a familiar sacred text or learnt-by-heart prayer. Individuals who say they have no religious affiliation may still be comforted to hear the words of The Lord's Prayer (Our Father...) or Psalm 23 (The Lord is my shepherd...). And, as experience attests, when words fail us completely, we may still light a candle and/or sit together in silence.

#### Where heaven and earth meet

The beauty of the Ammerdown experience is that it meets people where they are. If individuals need to receive words, Ammerdown has them. It they need to share their own words, Ammerdown will listen. And if folk prefer to dwell in silence, Ammerdown offers peaceful sanctuary. As we know, hospitality, peace and reconciliation at Ammerdown come with complimentary birdsong, woodland walks and a labyrinth. After all, where else, could a chaplain start his day like this?
